Biosecurity Queensland Electric Ant Program

We have so far surveyed 218 properties in the Saddle Mountain/Black Mountain area with only 10 properties outstanding – no further electric ants have been found here apart from the existing area.

There have been 143 other free yard checks booked, almost all have now been surveyed and two new infestations found: Koah/Kuranda #2 and Kuranda #18. Kuranda #18 is a single property that has already been treated. Koah/Kuranda #2 is still being delineated but should be treated sometime this week, weather permitting.

We are still encouraging people to book their properties in for a free yard check and will be recommencing our Facebook campaign shortly. We will also soon be moving to the next area of Kuranda to continue our targeted surveillance and we ask residents to continue allowing our staff access; it has been great so far.

With much sadness – thanks for the life of Rudi and Ann Husek

It was with much disbelief and sadness that we heard on Tuesday 19th of the fatal crash in Nepal which took the lives of Rudi and Ann Husek from Russet Park. Rudi was a regular planter with Envirocare and over the years put in thousands of trees in the corridors around Kuranda. He took on an area by the river near Russet Park, making it his own. He continuted to maintain and plant more after some initial planting by the Saturday morning crew. That's quiet dedication for you. Rudi won the Helen Adams Memorial Barron River Catchment Management Association award in 2015, after reaching the 2000 tree mark, all on his own. We conspired with his wife Ann to trick Rudi into coming to morning tea to receive the award. He was a good humoured, humble, gentle, man who didn't like any fuss. Rudi also volunteered with the Yellow Crazy Ant task force, turning up regularly for baiting and monitoring activities when he was not away helping out with the grandchildren or trekking in his beloved Nepalese mountains. He and Ann were both very fit through tennis and walking and Ann was accompanying Rudi this time on a journey to the Himalayas. Sadly to be their last. Our hearts and thoughts are with their family.

Envirocare invited the community to a quiet contemplation of Rudi's life on the banks of the Barron River, on Saturday 22nd, at "his site" where we fulfilled his last words to us, "please water my plants", laid a small tribute of rainforest flowers and fruit, and shared stories of his and Ann's lives with us in Kuranda.

John was responsible for establishing the FNQ node of the Queensland Herbarium and with 40 years' experience in flora survey and mapping across northern Australia, particularly on Cape York Peninsula, he has discovered at least 200 unnamed species.
