This year, Kuranda Koala Gardens is celebrating its 21st birthday

Koala Gardens opened its doors in May 2002, after converting the old bungy-jumping area at the Kuranda Heritage Markets into wildlife enclosures and a pond full of freshwater crocodiles.

The park has come from humble beginnings, originally housing only a handful of iconic Australian species such as koalas, wombats, and a few species of snakes. But, after a welcome renovation in 2016, Koala Gardens now boasts some of the most rare and curious of Australia's wonderful wildlife, including the endangered bilby, Northern bettong, and Mahogany glider, local favourite the Boyd's forest dragon, and the ever-smiling quokka.

Koala Gardens is also proud to participate in several breeding programs to help native threatened and endangered species. In the past, we have welcomed Northern bettong joeys, and last year we were thrilled to welcome two sets of twin girls - one from our Mahogany gliders and the other from our bilbies.

There are plans in the works for a weekend-long celebration in May, and we hope the local community will come out and help us mark this very special occasion! Kuranda Koala Gardens is located in the Kuranda Heritage Markets, and is open daily 10am-4pm.

I would love to see more 'green bins' in town, more gardens in town, more butterflies in town (not just in the Butterfly Sanctuary), I want to see Kuranda changing into a healthier environment. And a starting point to make a sanctuary out of mother earth. I know this is a big dream, but I feel it could work if we represent a healthy town with healthy roots, as an example for whoever is passing through.

I find that many places in Australia are trying to hold this 'hippie vision' but in actual fact it's a bit plastic. And still very much created for people that can afford to live in a consuming world. A consuming world where we buy everything, instead of being creative and giving tools to become a responsible human being. And give back to an original way of being. I also find that there is not enough support for homeless people, and people that have gotten lost in this patriarchal system.

I would love to see more kindness from the people that do have a great business, I understand that we still have a lot to learn about sharing and caring. And if we haven't experienced this part of life ourselves yet that it could be a challenge to bring awareness and also change. I find it very hard to share my idea in words, because I learned that walking my talk moves more than trying to plant ideas into my surroundings.

I would like to spend some time and energy to work for funding to go into the community. I'd rather do that than having a normal job, and paying into a system I do not believe in. If there would be abundance, or leftovers from the cafes, or just a kind person to talk with, then we would know what has been happening for people, and where we can support one another, instead of filling in forms and only get help if we conform into a governmental system that obviously isn't really working with us. It's giving away our responsibility for a better community and being self reliant.

I feel if we look into our world nowadays, that Kuranda could be an amazing activation point of people WALKING this change. It just needs to come together, and having a grounding space for that could be an amazing opportunity. I would love to know how you feel about this, and if there is a way to start creating funding for our community! And I would want to be involved with that.

STREET TREES OF KURANDA



The smooth green trunk and branches of the Cadaghi tree often bear an uncanny resemblance to human limbs – possibly the Hulk's?

In the Kuranda district, Cadaghi trees are naturally found in wet sclerophyll forest, on rainforest margins and as an emergent in rainforest which is advancing into eucalypt forest. And increasingly in residents' gardens where the pink fuzzy leaved seedlings often appear as volunteers and are easy to cultivate. Here in their native northeast Queenland habitat, they also co-exist with our native Stingless bees who gain benefits, not just in pollen but also the resin produced by the tree after pollination. This resin is important for hive building. It is also thought the pungent resin has both antibacterial and anti-fungal properties which contribute to hive health. The tree's benefit is to have seeds transported (sometimes over a kilometre) along with the sticky resin.

They certainly are a great favourite of many local gardeners. However, like the Hulk, cadaghis can also be unpredictable and can shed heavy limbs without warning. So while the shade and wide spreading branches are tempting it is probably wise to admire them from a distance and keep swings, sitting areas and sandpits at a distance.

Djabugay people are proud of their cultural heritage and take every opportunity to promote their culture and to educate non-Djabugay people about caring for country. *The Djabugay Bulmba Bama Plan*, a blueprint for how Djabugay Cultural Heritage can be protected and managed into the future, identifies as a major priority the action of Community Engagement.

The aim of good community engagement is ultimately about teaching people to have a deeper understanding of the country in which we live and helping the whole of our community to become more aware of what is happening to our country from a range of impacts and more importantly how we may work to improve that.

One of the activities that the Djabugay Elders like best is taking people, particularly the young, back to country, telling stories and helping to unfold an understanding and appreciation of the old ways and the old knowledge.

A recent "Back to Country Day" saw five Kuranda District State College students—who are studying towards a Certificate II in Conservation and Ecosystem Management—and their teacher join with two Djabugay Elders and the Djabugay Bulmba Rangers to visit Mona Mona for a day immersed in country to experience both the old and the new.

The student's first stop was the Mona Mona Mission site where they explored some of the remaining buildings and other cultural fabric and heard firsthand stories of life in that institution. The profound experience of those people has provided layers of complexity and depth to the rich cultural heritage of the Djabugay people.

Back along the road the students then visited Mimu lagoon. This important wetland has featured in the visits of previous KDSC groups. Over the last two years these groups have observed the transformation of this lagoon as the Bulmba Rangers have spent much time installing fencing to keep out feral horses and achieving a more appropriate cultural burning program. These actions have resulted in both positive and negative changes which the students were able to explore. Removing the feral animals has seen an improvement in water quality and a regular monitoring program is keeping tabs on this. Unfortunately, it has also resulted in an increase in the presence of hymenachne, a weed of national significance, which now has to be manually removed. The students got their feet wet engaging with both of these activities.

These young people are taking an active interest in caring for country and in their efforts have won the strong support of their Elders. Respect both ways.

I am pleased to provide an update to residents and ratepayers on some of the latest news from Council.

Parks & Open Spaces Action Plan

Council is continuing to implement the Parks & Open Spaces Strategy and community consultation has commenced for the upcoming Bicentennial Lakes Revitalisation Project.

The project will include works in the southern section, from Rankin Street to Keeble Street and in the northern section from Keeble Street towards

the Granite Creek. The project will see significant earthworks in the southern section to improve the overall water flow, as well as preparing the site for an exciting new active recreational precinct and playground.

I would like to invite all residents to the on-site information sessions scheduled for April. These sessions will take place at the Lakes, and Councillors and Council Officers will be available to answer any project related questions.

Council has also issued a survey to gather input from residents on the design of the active recreation space planned for the Lakes. With a limited budget, we may not be able to do it all, but Council will use your feedback, to prioritise the elements in the play area. Visit Council's website and search 'Bicentennial Lakes' for a link to the survey.

Another project I am looking forward to is the opening of the new Splash Park in Mareeba. The aquatic centre has been extended to accommodate the splash park with the installation of a new retaining wall and perimeter fence. The project will evolve relatively quickly now that the underground works have been completed, and Council anticipates that the facility will open mid-year.

Mareeba Shire Local Tourism Organisation Think Tank

Earlier this month I joined fellow Councillors and 65 tourism stakeholders at the Mareeba Shire Local Tourism Organisation (LTO) Think Tank, facilitated by Tourism Tropical North Queensland. The meeting was a great success and provided a well needed opportunity for all of us to work together within the broader tourism network to promote our diverse Shire.

This is keeping with our commitment to double the number of Indigenous rangers from 100 to 200.

Greetings to the Kuranda Community

The Kuranda Police have been busy lately which has highlighted a few issues and topics that I would like to cover.

Property crime

The first relates to property crime and what we can do as a community to reduce crime from occurring. I recommend making sure your houses and cars are locked up. The majority of break and enters are done through unlocked doors or entry points offering minimal resistance. House break ins can occur even when the occupants are home.

The majority of stolen vehicles are done by using the vehicle's keys. Either the keys have been left in the vehicle or they are stolen from inside the house. It is recommended to secure your vehicle's keys and don't leave them hanging in obvious places.

I also recommend not carrying large amounts of cash around or left in your home or car. I encourage the community to consider increasing their security by locking doors, installing CCTV and upgrading locks. Officers speak with so many victims of crime that only increase their security AFTER they have been a victim.

Driving to the conditions

There have been a significant number of crashes on the Kuranda Range lately, some of which were a result of drivers undertaking risky behaviours such as drink and drug driving, distraction and inattention, speeding, fatigue, and failure to wear a seat belt. These are known as the 'Fatal Five'.

The Range is used by a large number of vehicles every day. There are slow vehicle lanes that should be utilised by drivers wanting to drive slower or take extra care on the Range. It's important to show consideration to other vehicles if you are driving slowly, and pull over into these lanes when able.

There is little point speeding or driving aggressively on the Range. You will only end being stuck behind a bigger and slower vehicle or endanger yourself and other road users to save a minute off your trip.

If time is important to you, I would encourage you to simply leave one minute earlier!

Violence and substance abuse

Lastly, I want to touch on violence and substance abuse in the community. We are still seeing violence in the community which will not be tolerated.

The majority of these incidents involve the consumption of alcohol, often at dangerous and unnecessary levels.

I encourage everyone to drink responsibly and think about your actions including words spoken before you actually speak or act. If not for yourself, for the younger generation that are witness to these incidents and are at a high risk of imitating the behaviour as they grow older and have families of their own.

The Bob Madden Bridge and the Street Library at Speewah

On 20 March, the Mareeba Shire Council held a ceremony to rename the Groves Creek Bridge on Speewah Road the 'Bob Madden Bridge'. Mayor Angela Toppin and Bob Madden's longterm partner, Marie Boswarva, released the ribbon to reveal the new sign at the bridge. The ceremony was attended by councillors, members of the public (including many long-term friends of Bob), and members of the Speewah District Residents Association (SDRA).

This was the result of a submission by the SDRA to Council to rename the bridge in support of Marie Boswarva who wished to commemorate Bob Madden's enormous altruistic contribution to Speewah into perpetuity. There was whole-hearted support for this submission from councillors, many of whom expressed their great appreciation for his personable approach to activism and volunteerism, his talent for engaging with people, and for his many altruistic achievements for the community. Also, Dennis Hunter expressed support for the SDRA's submission on behalf of the Djabugay Aboriginal Corporation because of Bob Madden's 'big role in his Speewah community'.

While Bob was active in many areas of volunteerism, it was his work towards finding better solutions for telecommunications at Speewah that will continue to affect residents of Speewah into the future and improve our lifestyle in our neighbourhood. For example, thanks to Bob's concerted efforts, we now have mobile coverage and internet reception at Speewah, connecting us in many ways with the outside world.

As part of this legacy, Bob Madden worked with local and federal governments to lobby for the two-laned bridge into Speewah to ensure that the community would not be isolated during a major wet event. Bob's work to improve his neighbourhood was largely 'behind the scenes', which is not uncommon for voluntary work.

This is certainly also the situation for those involved in creating a street library on Speewah Road in Roscommon Park. SDRA member Aneta Thomsen, Jan Thomsen, Jo Garbellini and Calvin Baker have been working to make this community facility for locals and visitors alike. It stems from Aneta's travels overseas to places where she used similar street libraries, as a friendly way of sharing books with strangers and residents. Our street library was made entirely from donated materials, expertise, and labour. It is built it from marine ply to fit with our climate and is painted in colours to complement the landscape and the mural at Roscommon, resulting in a practical and very aesthetically pleasing adjunct to our public park and street appeal. Its position gives easy access for children playing at the playground or horse-riding, and for anyone walking, riding, or driving past to find a book to read or to drop some off to share for others. The SDRA would also like to thank the Mareeba Shire Council who worked with our secretary Jo Garbellini to incorporate it into our public infrastructure.

The next SDRA meeting will be the AGM to be held on 12 June at 6pm and we look forward to seeing many old and new faces there. This is a chance for Speewah residents to connect with each other and with Council, State and Federal government about issues affecting the neighbourhood. 

A Grinter's Tale

I long for longevity, not for me personally, but my belongings. Minimalism is definitely looking attractive.

I'moldenough to remember when toasters and keyboards worked for more than two weeks, I remember vegetables that weren't treated with 1-methylcyclopropene and vacuums that didn't require a mechanical engineering certification to reassemble after cleaning.

And all young girls had normal lips...

I feel like a kid trying to push a square shape through a round hole in a plastic toy. I'm a very impatient person, and have to leave it in bits and walk away to calm down. I used to be like that with knitting when I was a child. No-one really knits anymore, but then I suppose historically we did progress from animal skins too.

I actually threw money at a good vacuum, a Samsung upright model with a good pedigree and a big price tag. In return for being such a sucker myself, the retailer threw another sucker into the arena. 

In opening this morning, I would like to first pay our respect to our ancestors who once walked this land in a time not so long ago. We also pay respect to Buluwai neighbouring tribes being Djabugay north, Idindji south, Irukandji east and Muluridji west.

For those who don't know me, I am the sister of Willie Brim, who would normally be here today but unfortunately, has to attend a Native Title meeting in Cairns. So please have patience with me today, since I'm pretty much a novice at this.

For myself and for many years, I have had the opportunity to work at DSS/Centrelink, Warringu Women's Shelter and Woompera-Muralug Social Housing in the Cairns. In all of these places, life has not been kind. You can see that people didn't want to be there, but who needed to be. I do believe though, it's within all of our nature, to stretch out our hand, help our fellow man to steady himself and with small steps, start to walk forward again.

Back in the Centrelink days and also with family members, you see the change in people after having specialised care. They kind of glow because their diet is healthier. They have a smile on their face because they've achieved a major milestone in their life and their future looks better. It makes you happy, because they are and that's the way it should be.

Today, Buluwai traditional owners see the opening of Djindigal Rehabilitation Service as being that unified out stretched hand ready to help people and environment-wise, there is no better place to start than within nature itself and we have plenty of it. Nature after all, is harsh but doesn't judge.

So now without any further ado, and for the promise of future, I extend my hands and welcome you all to Buluwai country.



NOW'S THE TIME TO PLANT

CHOOSE NATIVES - WHY?

Plants that belong here support insects, spiders, birds and animals that belong here. When you plant nonnative plants like bromeliads, heliconias, syngonium and philodendron creepers (non-native ones), you are denying our native wildlife their habitat. Some of our frogs and insects adapt to these non-native plants, but for the most part they die off because they've lost their food and protection sources. All the non-natives mentioned above are, in fact, weeds in our gardens. Love where you live – don't try to turn it into something that belongs in another place. You need to change, not this place. You are the one who came here; this place didn't move to you. Celebrate its uniqueness and respect its fragility.

The Kuranda Conservation Community Nursery is a native plant nursery, because it is the right thing to do.

IDENTIFYING CASSOWARIES - but they all look the same!

Yes, they are all blue, black and red with a great big casque in the middle of their head, as Paul Webster wrote in his song, but the casque can be a defining feature. You'll see how different the two casques are in these photos. Things to look for in the casque to identify a particular bird are:

- Size (tall and straight, wide and dumpy)
- Is it straight or bending over to one side?
- If it's damaged, does it have scratches or notches cut out of it?
- Is the surface texture smooth, wrinkled, dented or creased?
- Colouring is it half black and half brown, light golden or a dark brown?

If you keep seeing the same features time and time again, then you'll be seeing the same bird. Give it a name.

Working with the Kuranda community to preserve our history and tell our stories

Kuranda Early Burials

Before the Kuranda Cemetery was established in 1931, people were buried either on their properties or on public land. Kuranda resident, Lorraine Ryle has been researching where our early settlers were buried as part of the Kuranda Historical Society Early Grave Project.

While there were several requests made to the Queensland Land Department from as early as 1909, for a cemetery reserve, rubbish and sanitary facilities in Kuranda, it wasn't until 1931 that an area was granted. Lorraine is still investigating whether the early burials were near the grave of J.W.H. Keating, which is over the road from the Honey House in Kuranda's Rotary Park. The road at this point (Therwine Street) was the original entry road into Kuranda after the Barron River crossing, before the Kuranda by-pass was constructed in the 1980s.

These are a few tantalising snippets from early newspapers that have led Lorraine to continue her research ...

> In November 1900, a reporter from a Sydney paper stated that there was no cemetery in Kuranda but noted there was a little grave beside the Smithfield Track where two little children were buried. (Source: The Sydney Stock and Station Journal 9.11.1900 page 3)

Fred Bendig, an early settler who was renowned for his gardens, died in 1900. A report on page 2 of The Morning Post on 1 August 1900, said he had been "buried in the burial ground used in Kuranda for the last twelve years".

"Old Charlie"

A Cairns Post article in 1931 reported that there was "no room in Kuranda to bury the horse 'Old Charlie', so he was buried in the "New Cemetery".

Occasionally amongst the myriad of moths that turn up at the porch light you may see a small insect with delicate lace-like wings. Not surprisingly these insects are known as lacewings. There are many species which occur in our local region, but the most striking are the green lacewings which are intriguing little animals.

Green lacewings' wings are held in a tent-like fashion over the body, and other than the wing veins, are completely transparent. Their eyes are also very distinctive, and are ruby red in colour. They reflect brightly and look like jewels due to their compound lenses (many tiny lenses that make up the Above: An adult Green lacewing with spectacular jewel-like eyes.

a variety of moth eggs. They have long, sharp mandibles to impale their prey, which they consume in large numbers in order to grow quickly. Their entire lifecycle takes around a month to complete, and adult females can lay up to 600 eggs

These insects are certainly one which gardeners could consider a true ally. In fact, green lacewings are so effective as predators in the garden that they are sold commercially for use as bio-control agents. Several businesses breed and sell them online within Australia.

Adult green lacewings have a fluttering flight, and can be found in the garden feeding upon nectar. They tend to hide underneath leaves when they are resting and their colour provides excellent camouflage amongst green foliage. They also have the ability to release a strong smelling liquid when they are disturbed, and I have personally witnessed a spider attacking and then releasing a lacewing due to this chemical defence.

Green lacewings lay their eggs on plants, either attached to the stems or to the leaves. The remarkable thing about green lacewing eggs is that they lay them attached to individual stalks. This elevation protects them from predators roaming the plants looking for food, particularly animals such as ants. Many people mistake these eggs for tiny fungi.

As soon as they hatch, the larvae of green lacewings themselves become predators, and savage ones at that. In garden pest control, these insects are extremely valuable due to their choice diet of thrips, aphids, scale insects, mites and



Why won't this grow?

Ever wonder why you can't grow the rainforest plants that your friend does? Well there's differences in rainfall versus watering and the soils...and then there's the fungi.

Yes, a group called mycorrhizal. These fungi are known to play a crucial role in the growth and health of rainforest trees. But how? The fungal filaments are in a cooperative relationship with the trees (symbiosis), significantly increasing the surface area available to the trees to absorb nutrients and water. These filaments are everywhere under the soil and sometimes called the 'worldwide fungi web'. In return, the tree provides the fungi with carbohydrates and other compounds which come from photosynthesis (the way trees use sunlight to fuel the tree's food processing, something which fungi can't do for themselves).

So what specifically does this relationship provide trees? First up, improved nutrient uptake where the fungi provide essential nutrients like phosphorous, nitrogen and other micronutrients which are limited in our local soils. The fungi break down organic matter and the way nutrients are bound into the soil and presents them to trees in a 'chemical' form the trees can take up. Improved water absorption due to the spread of the fungi hyphal 'network' which increases surface area for gathering water, making the trees more resilient to drought and other environmental stressors. Also mycorrhizal fungi can act as a physical barrier against stressors such as soil acidity, heavy metals and pathogens. Even at the seedling stage the fungi promote germination and establishment of seedlings by providing nutrients and water.

But not all mycorrhizal fungi are the same! Like with many relationships, some trees prefer certain species of fungi. In fact some seedling species appear to hold their growth until

sufficient numbers of the 'right' fungi are present to support further growth e.g. Black bean seedlings (Castenospremum australe). Mycorrhizal fungi also promote plant diversity and ecosystem stability in the rainforest by assisting the coexistence of various tree species, which contributes to the overall stability and resilience of the ecosystem. Envirocare has a rescue set of vines along the fence line at the nursery, next to the potting shed. Just drive up the tracks and drop your over population crisis onto some juicy leaves there anytime, no need to call us. Need to plant more vines, we have plenty in stock.

Plant of the month – Native Gardenia Gardenia ovularis

Its found in our Far North Queensland forests from Cooktown to Innisfail.

Ant-ics Workshop

What a morning of antspiration! The Taskforce joined forces with **Biosecurity Queensland** National Electric Ant Eradication Program and Wet Tropics Management Authority's Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program to deliver an information session all about ants.

Overall, the event was a wonderful opportunity to gain insight into a publicly funded eradication program, learn about the wonders of an ant's life, recognise invasive ants and why public support and vigilance is one of the keys to a successful eradication of invasive ants from within and adjacent to the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area.

We spotted several Wood frogs Papurana daemeli, along the way enjoying the cool muddy banks of Owen Creek. No yellow crazy ants were detected, however, Biosecurity Queensland did take two suspect electric ant samples to be checked.

Thanks to Wet Tropics Management Authority's Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program staff for training up the Taskforce volunteers and Biosecurity Queensland for your support with eradication program staff and expertise. Also, a shout-out to our wonderful Taskforce volunteers and the residents for your cooperation with permissions and ease of access for our team on the day. It was a successful and important collaboration working

ant in a 'carrier'. A carrier is any object that attracts ants to want to hide or nest in or on a carrier. A carrier is often a raw material such as soil, mulch, potted plants, cuttings, timber, rocks and garden waste. Other carriers can be machinery, household items and any other movable man-made objects.

Yellow crazy ants are believed to have arrived in Cairns in 2001 at the port on a shipment of timber. The timber was moved to the Edmonton area and from there. the ants were spread. The yellow crazy ants in Russett Park were traced from the movement of soil and mulch from Edmonton to Russett Park. Fitting examples of human assisted movement.

When invasive ants are spread through human assisted movement, the humans moving them often don't know they are carrying them. If the public can recognise an invasive ant and are aware of known infestation areas, this awareness is a huge step toward preventing further spread.

Lastly, if you own a business working with raw materials or offer a lawn and garden care service in the Kuranda area, you can equip yourself with invasive ant knowledge by booking a free toolbox talk. Toolbox talks take 20-30 minutes to deliver and include live invasive ants for recognition.

WHAT'S HAPPENING

Friends of the frogs are back

We are back in action with our first yellow crazy ant survey for 2023 in Kuranda Tree frog (KTF) habitat.

Yellow crazy ants and electric ants have been found in Kuranda Tree frog habitat. In early 2022 the Taskforce decided to check the lower reaches of creeks that are home to our critically endangered and endemic Kuranda tree frog. These monthly surveys will help to minimise the threats that yellow crazy ants pose to these and

toward invasive ant eradication.

The next KTF survey will be in Cain Creek 22 April 2023 - only four positions available on our team of six, so get in quick. No experience necessary but a medium level of fitness is required.

Invasive ants and human assisted movement

Human assisted movement is the movement of ants, particularly invasive yellow crazy ants and electric ants by humans to other uninvaded areas. This is the leading cause of invasive ant spread and the quickest way for invasive ants to move large distances away from its original location.

How do they hitch a ride with humans? When humans visit a known or unknown infestation of yellow crazy ants or electric ants, they may pick up some ants with a queen



Join the invasive resist-ants

From the gangs on the streets of Western Sydney, sustaining a life-changing injury, becoming a selfsufficient community founder and frog defender, to a rights advocate, sit-down comedian, ghost hunter and forming a band, Paul Innes' has been an extreme but inspiring rock-and-rollercoaster ride.

Thirty-four years after an accident that left him a quadriplegic, Paul is living his best life. What would have broken most people he says was the making of him. Instead of being weakened by his injury, it has empowered him in many diverse ways.

In his autobiography, Make or Break: The Extraordinary Life of Paul Innes, Paul reminds you that you can do anything you can imagine in this world. Drawing on his life experiences, replete with awe-inspiring highs and heart-shattering lows, Paul challenges and inspires you to enjoy the infinite strength of your own spirit and life, while being buoyed and empowered by his.

Now living in the tropical paradise of Cairns, Far North Queensland, Paul was born in Darlinghurst, Sydney. He began an acting career before sustaining a spinal injury, which resulted in quadriplegia, while swimming in the Kuranda Weir in 1988, aged 20. After founding a rights incorporation for people with disabilities, Paul also went on to become a founding committee member of a number of community organisations. Some 34 years later, Paul Innes is a holder of two Guinness Book of World Records and teaches astral travel. He spends time writing and filming as a sit-down comedian and recording with his band Sweet Island Time.

Having also successfully created a sanctuary that brought back from the abyss, four of Queensland's frogs that were thought to be missing, he now searches for the next property that he will turn into a self-sufficient resort-style sanctuary. And his prosperous business, Independence World disability care service, now runs independently of him while he records with his band and does hilarious skits for his sit-down comedy. Indeed, Paul has led a remarkable and widely influential, contributory life.

Paul shares some excerpts from his book:

"I ventured into the town of Kuranda. I had in mind that I would look for a job but expected no offers, wearing no underpants and the see-through sarong that was my usual look.

"The First Nations peoples of Kuranda were a friendly and happy lot. The beautiful rainforest that surrounded them would surely make anybody happy. Most people in Kuranda seemed to be stoners, and everybody said they were an artist. I took jobs from landscaping and beekeeping to warden of the hostel, rainforest tour guide and laboratory assistant. Having volunteered for a number of years at the community amphitheatre, I helped to build structures and take care of visiting bands."

"I took off my shirt and waded into the water up to my knees. I assumed the Weir was at its normal full capacity as it had been raining for the last few nights. I leaned forward and began to breaststroke, with my head just slightly under the surface of the water. I had only swum a few body lengths when my head hit a rock that wasn't usually there. It stunned me, and I felt a sharp pain across the top of my head. My natural instinct was to feel what had happened to the top of my head and to lift my face out of the water for a breath. I could not move my arms or my head and simply floated to the top of the water. I tried to squirm and roll over, but nothing happened. After a short time, I could not hold my breath any longer. I began to inhale water, as I watched the river turn red as I bled. My eyes began to close as I felt consciousness drifting away. I called out to God to let me live. In that moment, the freedom and vigour that I enjoyed as a happy young man with a healthy body was to be lost for the rest of my life.'

"Spending a number of weeks in intensive care, my spirit prevailed. I was released to the general ward and began to regain some vitality. A benefit concert was organised for me in Kuranda, raising thousands of dollars to help me and my family through this traumatic time. Local bands performed and businesses donated goods to sell and auction. During the middle

of the concert, I received a phone call at the hospital from the organisers, and they passed around the phone so that I could speak to people. Then they put me on a loudspeaker to speak to the crowd. I had just written a song, which they asked me to sing. The familiar and friendly voices in the phone call gave me strength and incentive to try to regain any sense of a normal life."

"Growing up in Kuranda was a wonderful experience and precious memory for me. I have written this autobiography to illuminate the power, true beauty and genuine freedom of our spirit, and to highlight the strength and fulfilment that comes from community support. Writing my autobiography and sharing a few of the stories makes me feel like I'm giving back in some way."

TROUBLED ABOUT THE COST OF FOOD?

Food Co-Ops save money and grow community

Take \$200 to the supermarket today and you will be lucky to get four bags of groceries for it.

Fresh produce wrapped in plastic is more expensive than loose produce - which makes absolutely no sense, even from a cost perspective. Coconuts come from Malaysia despite being available locally in abundance, as do many other items that could be sourced locally. Labels are confusing and misleading and don't give us any true picture of how the product was made, or by whom, and how fair that exchange was. Sometimes corporations just refuse to label at all-the organic fresh food section is never labelled in Woolworthsdespite my regularly asking for it to be so. I find it strange in a country of over regulation, the things you want regulated like healthy air, land and food are not. But in a time of misinformation to outright lying, (some big corporations of the world have disinformation centres where they have writers creating disinformation to sow doubt and decision paralysis in people's minds about health foods, nutrition and anything else that hurts their profits), the weary consumer has no time or spirit to research buying the healthiest food at the best price. There are so many reasons to change how we shop and co-ops are a great solution to these food woes.

Food co-operatives are not new – the 1970s saw a boom in food co-ops due to the growing health foods movement and concerns about poor quality processed foods. Food co-ops are still a solution to a lot of these issues and work something like this:

- folk get together with a shared desire to have cheaper, good quality food
- a simple system of sourcing, distribution and payment is put in place
- members contact producers (hopefully local suppliers if possible), for fresh and dry produce and they order in bulk (wholesale)
- it's delivered to a central point often someone who volunteers adequate space to store it
- the produce is bagged and sorted by members

folk turn up at designated times to collect their goods

At its best, it's cheaper, healthier, the producer benefits, and there's far less packaging and food miles. If our money can be spent locally it stays in the community and brings about connections and resilience. We can have more power in asking for and supporting what's important to us like clean organic food that is nourishing, or no plastics, or local food that supports local farmers.

There is plenty of information available to help you find a local co-op group or start a food co-op of your own. It can be any scale—as few as four families can get together and buy bulk staples like flour, rice, lentils and tea—or it can involve the whole community. If your local Community Centre is supportive, they may provide space for your collection and distribution point as this can often be one of the hardest tasks to provide. Another must for food co-ops is ongoing energy and enthusiasm within its membership as it is based on a volunteer-run model.

The Open Food Network software platform allows farmers to sell produce online, at a price that works for them. There are no upfront costs and affordable membership fees only apply to monthly revenue of \$500 or more which means you can start where you are and get set-up quickly. Food producers can create an online shop, collect payments, and sell through other shops on the platform. Wholesalers can integrate with existing systems, manage buying groups and supply your produce through national or regional networks of food hubs and shops. Communities can bring together producers in your area to create a virtual farmers' market,



Lagos Spinach

Wow, what an amazing little tropical/pantropical treasure this plant is - and just one of the reasons that seedsavers is so fun, interesting, refreshing, nourishing and nutritious! How lucky that we can find, share and grow these plants in our gardens, feed ourselves, our families and friends, and our animals, with a growing array of fresh, organically-grown foods. How good does it feel to be able to collect seeds from these and bring them back to the seedbank? The first time we saw Lagos spinach in our little local seedsavers group, was at the lovely garden of one of our meeting hosts, and growing in an ornamental garden, - for which this plant is also renowned for, as it is very pretty with its colour and flowers. The grower asked if anyone knew what it was-as she had thought it may be edible and wanted to check-and so check we did. Harvesting some seeds we discovered that yes it is very edible, very nutritious, and as mentioned, also quite beautiful in the garden. Lagos spinach hales from around the region known as Nigeria in Africa, where it is a staple 'green' and used in many dishes. The leaves, the younger stems and the young flower buds are all cooked and prepared. Its common name is from the capitol of Nigeria, Lagos, and the Latin name is Celosia argentea. The plant is also known as soko yokoto ('makes husbands fat and happy' or 'makes husbands' cheeks rosy') velvet flower, cockscomb, quail-grass, efo soko and more. There are quite a few varieties, with various coloured and shaped leaves and flowers. There are other edible Celosias too (spicata, cristata, plumosa) and all part of the Amaranthaceae family (Amaranth).

energy in to growing more delicious leaves. If left to grow (in some areas) it can grow up to six feet tall, though usually up to around three feet. Also great to 'chop and drop' to build soil.

The annual plant can grow in many conditions including drought tolerance and poor soils, and can grow all through the year. It self-sows freely and is easy to share with friends and family. Leaves and flowers are sold at marketplaces in West Africa and beyond.

Use Lagos spinach in soups, stews, stir-fries, spinach pies, pizzas, dips, curries, pasta, pesto, and anywhere else you would use spinach. It is as easy to eat as it is to grow, though it is said, don't eat enormous amounts in one sitting, or just enjoy with probiotic, fermented and high-calcium foods to balance out the oxalates.

The seeds from the dried flowers are easy to harvest – they are so tiny you need a container to catch them as you roll the flowers between your hands. Collect the flowers from the plant before the seeds drop. The seeds are also edible, but as they are tiny, there may be other amaranth seed varieties that would be more suitable.

We have the lovely variety of Celosia (pictured) in our local seedbank.

Thanks for bringing any organically-grown, non-hybrid/non-gmo, open-pollinated heritage/heirloom seeds if you have any to spare for the seedbank. Or just bring you! All welcome! We start packing seeds in the seedbank from 10am.

Amaranth is renowned as a high iron source with vitamins A and C, protein and antioxidants, listed as second to moringa (miracle tree) in some sources, amongst other valuable nutritional needs. The Lagos spinach flowers can highlight a floral arrangement and still remain lovely in dried-flower sprays. Cutting the flowers also helps the plant put it's Happy gardening!



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WAYGAL-A-GALING BUWAL-WU Going looking for words



The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word 'aye' for yes.

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji

believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporations for their work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

BIBUNBAY: Children. Bibunbay wuruu-la yungang. The children are swimming in the river.

BIWUL: Mother-in-law. Nyurran biwul garrana nguma. Your mother-in-law is coming tomorrow.

BULBU: Old man (grey haired). Gulu bulbu wurrmba wunang. This old man is sleeping.

BURRIBURRI: Old man who has had all initiation cuts (scars are fading). Burriburri galing wayburra-la. The old, initiated man is going to the place beyond stars. DAYAL: Male/boy/man. Gudji dayal dagil. That man is strona.

DARRNGGI-DARRNGGI: Old woman. Darrnggidarrnggi wulnggu djanang. The old woman is singing.

DJABUL: Promised one. Ngawunggu ngayang djabul wambayina. I will marry my promised one.

DJADJA: Child of about two to ten years. Ngayang djadja wala bugany. My child already ate.

DJURRAY: Younger sister. Gulu djurray ngayang. This is my younger sister.

DUNYU: Husband/boyfriend. Ngayang dunyu wabarr-a-galiny. My husband went hunting.

GALNGA: Uncle, mother's brother. Ngayang galnga Gimunydja galiny. My uncle went to Cairns.

GAMI: Paternal grandfather or maternal grandmother.

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St Saviour's Thought for April

Our thought for April is taken from St Johns Gospel Chapter 20 verses 18 "Mary of Magdala went to the disciples with her news: I have seen the Lord!" she said, and gave them his message.

In the weeks after his resurrection there were many encounters between the disciples and Jesus. What is very important to notice is that in every such encounter Jesus points them to tasks they must do as a community. Even when the encounter is with an individual, as with Mary of Magdala near the garden tomb, she is discouraged from treasuring the moment for herself. The conversation turns very quickly from her joy. Instead she is pointed away from the encounter itself. She is to go and tell the community. The supreme irony of the story is the quality of the community she was sent to. It was abysmal!

As Mary moved away from the garden, beside herself with conflicting emotions, wanting both to stay with him but wanting also to tell the unbelievable news to others, we know only too well what the situation was elsewhere. Somewhere in the city, probably west of the temple area, and almost certainly within the vision of the Roman sentries patrolling the Antonine Tower, there was a group of traumatised men crowded into a single room, standing or sitting or lying in various stages of nervous exhaustion from restlessness to deep sleep. They had lived through a week-end of unbearable intensity culminating in a horror they had been warned repeatedly to expect but had found impossible to conceive until it took place. It was to this paralysed group that Mary was sent from the encounter in the Garden.

What paralyses our capacity to act? Usually we feel that the situation is too much for us. The task of recovery is too complex, too threatening, too demanding. There are Upper Rooms all over Western Christianity. The sounds of contemporary civilisation jar our senses and immobilise our powers. The old simple and comfortable institutional Christ has been taken by events and crucified on the cross of a cold, secularised, and harsh society. For many there is little to do but gather dutifully and sing the ancient songs in a strange and hostile land.

Yet into the terrified silence of that long ago room comes the sound of running feet up the outside steps, the ecstatic knocking at the door, the gasping figure tumbling in among them, the strangled message. After a moment's paralysis one man leaps for the door, and a moment later another follows, and the door swings shut again, leaving Mary to collect her jangled nerves.






